I wanted to update you on two issues prior to the Christmas holiday break.

## Regulating our Future (ROF) - change expectations for local authorities for 2019-2020

You will be aware that over the last year we have progressed from planning for food regulatory reform under the Regulating Our Future Programme (ROF) to delivery and implementation of some of the key elements of the modernised system. We want to provide you with some detail of what will be happening over the next twelve months and the changes we anticipate for local authorities. We hope that this will help for planning your work activities and programmes for the new financial year.

The appended table provides information on the areas of work that we will be taking forward next year where local authority change activity will be needed. It also outlines other areas of work where further development work will be taking place and on which we anticipate consultation/engagement with you over the next year.

## Consultation on the Food Law Code of Practice (England)

We are very grateful to all those who responded to the consultation that took place between July and September this year and for your views on changes that we proposed to align the Code with ROF changes to the regulatory system.

In the meantime, I can confirm that following analysis of the responses and further consideration of the issues, we propose at this stage only to take forward amendments related to enhanced registration and Primary Authority national inspection strategies. These changes will not be made, however, until after April 2019 and should not have an impact on your planning for 2019/20.

We will also be giving further consideration to the other issues that we consulted on and will come back to you about those in due course.

In relation to the UK's exit from the EU, we will write to you about the short-term impact on local authorities once we have more clarity on the terms of exit.

<ul> <li>Our expectations of local authorities are to:</li> <li>provide support, in partnership with their MIS provider, to introduce the new registration service</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>adopt the new registration link and encourage food business operators to use it</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>connect their MIS (databases) to the new digital registration system via the RAFB Application Programming Interface (API)</li> </ul>			
change registration processes to embed the new digital approach in their ways of working			
<ul> <li>amend local authority websites to reflect changes to the registration process and signposting to new pages for business support on food.giv.uk</li> </ul>

National inspection strategies	
• The changes to the Codes of Practice in England and Wales are expected to achieve better alignment between Primary Authority and the requirements of the Codes – although there has been the potential for any primary authority partnership to develop a national inspection strategy in England or Wales since 2009, the Codes of Practice have not specifically referenced them. National inspection strategies will now be referenced in the Codes for the first time.	<ul> <li>FSA does not expect the number of national inspection strategies to be significant during 2019/2020, and therefore is unlikely to impact significantly on planned interventions required by local authorities.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>FSA expects one or two primary authority partnerships will develop the first 'pilot' national inspection strategies for trialling during 2019.</li> <li>FSA will work collaboratively with these partnerships to support and learn from these trials.</li> </ul>	
• FSA expects local authorities with businesses included in a national inspection strategy to engage in the national inspection strategy pilot, and to follow the national inspection strategy as required by both Primary Authority legislation, and the requirements of the Codes.	
• FSA has published a first draft of the <u>FSA's standards</u> for primary authority partnerships who wish to develop and implement a national inspection strategy, and those that relate to the FSA's oversight and assurance roles.	
• FSA encourages local authorities to continue to provide their views on these draft standards, and any views they have during the trialling of the first national inspection strategies.

<ul> <li>Volunteer authorities will be working with a research company between January and April 2019 to help build the predictive models for future versions of the risk engine.</li> </ul>	The FSA has committed not to introduce the changes to the risk     assessment system until the new LA performance framework is in     place
<ul> <li>Inspection findings from new businesses registering through the RAFB service with early adopter local authorities will be used to validate the basic version of the rules engine.</li> </ul>	• Further consideration will be given to the proposed changes to the Food Law Code of Practice relating to concept of 'full compliance', recognising sustained compliance and removing the score for vulnerable groups.
