### Programme information and content

This programme aims to support the initial and continuing professional development of staff engaged in teaching and supporting learning in the University. It enables students to provide evidence of achievement at Descriptor 2 of the UK Professional Standards Framework (UKPSF) through demonstrating a broad understanding of effective approaches to teaching and learning support and providing evidence of: engagement in appropriate areas of activity; possession of core knowledge; and commitment to shared professional values.

### Module information

The programme comprises of 60 credits, allocated across three compulsory modules. The successful attainment of all 60 Level 7 credits will lead to the award of a Postgraduate Certificate in Academic Practice. Compulsory modules are listed.

### Compulsory modules

### Part-time or flexible modular arrangements

The programme is available on a part-time basis, with content being delivered in intensive blocks. In order to progress to EDMAP3 students must have a pass in EDMAP1 and EDMAP2 (40 Level 7 credits).

### Optional modules

All three modules are compulsory to attain the full Postgraduate Certificate in Academic Practice. In order to progress to EDMAP3 students must have a pass in EDMAP1 and EDMAP2.

### **Teaching and learning delivery**

The programme is taught through interactive workshops including group work, sharing practice, problem solving and case studies.

Total study hours for your programme will be 600 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is 54 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

### **Accreditation details**

EDMAP1 is accredited by Advance HE at Descriptor 1 of the UKPSF, so that successful completion of this module results in the award of HEA Associate Fellowship.

EDMAP1 and EDMAP2 are accredited by Advance HE at Descriptor 2 of the UKPSF, so that successful completion of both modules results in the award of HEA Fellowship.

### **Assessment**

The programme is assessed through a combination of written course work, a research project, a presentation and an evidence-based portfolio. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.
