Programme information and content

The Programme aims provide students with subject-specific knowledge, including knowledge of different kinds of French and English texts from a range of periods. It gives perspectives on different methods of critical analysis. You will develop the ability to understand native-spoken French within an educated French environment and to communicate orally with fluency and accuracy, to read with understanding and critical judgement and to write accurately in French with an appropriate understanding of register and style. More generally, the course aims to foster an independent approach to formulating problems and arguments, using the close reading and analytical skills that are fundamental to both disciplines. Throughout the programme, individual modules come with the option of an academic placement which complements and develops the learning on a module.

Part 1:	Introduces you to debate about approaches to the study of literature, through critical exercises and the close study of selected English and French texts from a number of different periods. You will develop your practical language skills in your core language module in all four areas (speaking, writing, reading, listening). You will also have the opportunity to understand and apply key terms in the structural analysis of language.	
Part 2:	Provides you with more comprehensive coverage, through the study of texts in historical periods and generic traditions. It further develops your practical language skills in your core language module, building on the work done in Part You will encounter and engage critically with a range of texts in French.	
Part 3:	Gives you the opportunity to undertake more specialized and independent literary study. You will choose your modules from a wide range of options. These may include the optional English Literature dissertation module, which develops your skills in research, planning and writing. Part 3 also builds on your existing French language skills, refining your use of more complicated structures as well as variation in register and style.	

Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

In French

Students must take one 20 credit module in Beginners or Intermediate or Advanced French language and at least one 20 credit content module in French.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules from a list provided by the Department of Modern Languages and European Studies.

Part 2 Modules:

In English Literature

Students must select 60 credits of optional modules from the Department of English Literature, with at least 20 credits selected from a list of pre-1800 modules.

In French

Students must take one 20 credit language module which will be dependent on the level studied at Part 1.

Students must take 40 credits of optional modules from a list provided by the Department of Modern Languages and European Studies, of which at least 20 credits will be made up of optional modules in French.

Modules during a placement year or study year (if applicable):

If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

Part 3 Modules:

English Literature

Students must select 60 credits from the Department of English Literature.

French

Students must take one 20 credit language module which will be dependent on the level studied at Part 2

Students must take 40 credits of optional modules from a list provided by the Department of Modern Languages and European Studies, of which at least 20 credits will be made up of optional modules in French.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your Programme is set out in the Further Programme Information. Details of optional modules for each part, including any Additional Costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs.

For textbooks and similar resources:

In **English Literature**: we recommend that you budget between £150 to £250 a year.

In **French**: we recommend that you budget between £50 to £75 a year. The core textbook(s), which most students normally purchase, cost(s) £25 new, and there may be other books/resources which you would find it convenient to buy.

Some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions.

Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus at a cost of £0.05 per page.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations.

The estimates were calculated in 2019.

Placement opportunities

You will be provided with the opportunity to undertake a credit-bearing placement as part of your Programme. This will form all or part of an optional module. You will be required to find and secure a placement opportunity, with the support of the University.

Teaching and learning delivery:

You will be taught through a combination of lectures, seminar discussion and essay tutorials. French language modules are taught in small groups, and include use of language laboratory resources. The Dissertation module is supported by workshops and individual supervision.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 300 hours, Part 2 - 192 hours, Part 3 - 168 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Assessment

The programme will be assessed through a combination of written examinations, coursework (including class tests) and oral examinations. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.

Progression

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows *Part 1*

- (i) obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (ii) obtain a mark of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 100 credits taken in Part 1.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

- (iii) obtain a mark of at least 40% in a 20 credit French language module and a 20 credit French content module, at Part 1; and
- (iv) obtain a mark of at least 40% in the compulsory English Literature module EN1RC, and obtain a mark of at least 40% in either of the compulsory English literature modules EN1GC or EN1PE, at Part 1

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Part 2

To gain a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken at Part 2; and
- (ii) obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits; and
- (iii) obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits, except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3 in the **3 year programme**, a student must achieve a threshold performance

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.
