Programme information and content

The programme aims to provide you with subject-specific knowledge and more general skills, including knowledge of a variety of different kinds of literary texts, from a range of periods, as well as perspectives on different methods of creative and critical analysis. The course also aims to foster an independent approach to formulating problems and arguments, using the close reading and analytical skills that are fundamental to the discipline.

Students who meet the progression requirements at the end of their foundation year will be able to transfer onto any BA Programme in the School of Humanities or the School of Literature and Languages, or joint programmes across the schools.

Throughout the programme, individual modules come with the option of an academic placement which complements and develops the learning on a module. Study Abroad opportunities are also available at Parts 2 and 3.

Foundation year:	The Foundation Year will offer a broad, immersive experience for students within the Arts and Humanities. Students be supported by a central skills module and a subject specific skills development module. These modules will provide students with the knowledge, experience and study skills needed to succeed in a BA Programme in the Arts and Humanities.
Part 1:	Part 1 of our programme will provide debate about approaches to the study of literature, through critical and research exercises and close study of selected texts from a number of different periods.
Part 2:	Part 2 will provide greater breadth of coverage, and studies texts within historical periods and generic traditions.
Part 3:	In Part 3 you will undertake more specialized and independent literary study, choosing your modules from a wide range of options. The dissertation module develops your skills in research, planning and writing.

Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

Part 0 Modules:

Students must take one 20 credit subject specific skills module.

Students must take two 40 credit modules from the School of Literature and Languages and the School of Humanities.

International Students take IF0ACA (Academic Skills), in place of IF0RAS (Foundation in Academic Skills), as IF0ACA is specifically targeted to the needs of international students.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the Department of English Literature and modules from elsewhere in the University.

Part 2 Modules:

Students must select at least 100 credits from English Literature, with at least two 20 credit modules selected from a list of pre-1800 modules. Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the Department of English Literature and modules from elsewhere in the University.

Modules during a placement year or study year (if applicable):

Students on one of the 5 year programmes will take one 120 credit module in either Work Experience or Study Abroad. Students may be permitted to undertake a placement year or a study abroad year between Part 2 and Part 3 of the programme. In such cases students will transfer to a 5-year programme. The placement or study abroad year should not normally be shorter than nine months full-time. If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the Department of English Literature and up to 20 of credits modules from elsewhere in the University.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your Programme is set out in the Further Programme Information. Details of optional modules for each part, including any Additional Costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs.

For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between £150 to £250 a year. Some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions.

Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus at a cost of £0.05 per page.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations.

Placement opportunities

Placements:

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a credit-bearing placement as part of your Programme. This will form all or part of an optional module. You will be required to find and secure a placement opportunity, with the support of the University.

Study Abroad:

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a Study Abroad placement during your Programme. This is subject to you meeting academic conditions detailed in the Programme Handbook, including obtaining the relevant permissions from your School, and the availability of a suitable Study Abroad placement. If you undertake a Study Abroad placement, further arrangements will be discussed and agreed with you.

Teaching and learning delivery:

You will be taught through seminars, lectures and individual consultations.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical

set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 252 hours, Part 2 - 144 hours, Part 3 - 144 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Assessment

The programme will be assessed through a combination of written examinations and coursework.

Progression

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows

Foundation Year:

- (i) an overall average of at least 40% over all modules taken in Part 0; with
- (ii) no more than 40 credits of these modules with a mark below 35% and
- (iii) at least 40% in the Academic Skills module.

In order to progress from Part 0 to Part 1, a student must achieve a threshold performance and

(iv) at least 40% in the Academic Skills module and any specified 20 credit subject specific skills module.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Foundation Year qualifies a student for a Certificate of Completion if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part

Part 1

- (i) obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (ii) obtain a mark of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 100 credits taken in Part 1.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in the compulsory English Literature module EN1RC, and obtain a mark of at least 40% in either of the compulsory English literature modules EN1GC or EN1PE, at Part 1..

For students transferring from BA English Literature and Language into Part 2 of BA English Literature, alternative level 4 modules in English Literature, up to 20 credits, may be substituted in the list of compulsory modules in place of EN1GC. Students would then be subject to the progression rules applicable to students on BA English Literature.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Part 2

To gain a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken at Part 2; and
- (ii) obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits; and
- (iii) obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits, except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3 in the **3 year programme**, a student must achieve a threshold performance

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3 in the **4 year programme**, a student must achieve a threshold performance and obtain a pass in the professional/workplacement or study abroad year. Students who fail the professional/placement year transfer to the non-placement year version of the programme.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.
