Programme information and content

The MSc in Leadership and Strategic Studies (Executive) aims to provide selected army officers with the higher education provision to support their service requirements and to enable them to act as effective officers of the British Army. This degree will be available to selected entrants to the Intermediate Command and Staff Course (Land), (ICSC(L)) at the Defence Academy Shrivenham, and will support their development during Career Stage 2 (CS2), following promotion to the rank of Major. All of these entrants will have studied all of the army courses in CS1.

The degree has been shaped to include the learning that they undertake on the mandatory army courses during CS2 which will be strengthened by a series of modules, all at Level 7 linked to these courses and provided via a digitalized platform (PLP) by Henley Business School and the School of Politics, Economics and International Relations (SPEIR).

The credit bearing of the army courses can only be realized by completing the accompanying Extension Module (EM) relevant to that course. An explanation of the Curriculum Mapping is given in a separate document. There will be Research Methods and Negotiated Learning Modules at Level 7, although commencement of these modules may begin during the middle of the programme, so that students have the opportunity to begin their understanding of Research Methods and to collect data and experiences during their work postings.

The main content of the MSc in the Extension Modules, from the Henley/SPEIR perspective is to provide academic content building on knowledge in the broad areas of Leadership and Strategic Studies. These will be more heavily theoretical than the army courses and will cover areas such as:

- Leadership theory
- Personal leadership
- Developing others
- International relations
- Politics and the political environment

• The changing nature of conflict

Each module will be formatively and summatively assessed at the appropriate level. There will be a module for Research Methods and a Negotiated Learning Project (NLM), which is the Capstone element of the degree. The NLM will be available either in Leadership-based topics (Henley) or in Politics and International Relations-based topics (SPEIR), and as a dissertation form or as a work-based project.

This programme will be overseen by a Board of Studies which will be constituted specifically to focus on this suite of programmes. This BoS will be chaired by the respective TLD of Henley and SPEIR on a rotational basis and will be called the AHEP BoS. There will be representation from Henley, SPEIR, Army (uniformed and academic), programme administration, regulatory and student support services and the relevant student body.

All regulations relating to students on UoR programmes will apply, including those for academic and non-academic misconduct.

The MSc will meet the FHEQ criteria for a Level 7 Master's degree.

Master's degrees are awarded to students who have demonstrated:

- a systematic understanding of knowledge, and a critical awareness of current problems and/or new insights, much of which is at, or informed by, the forefront of their academic discipline, field of study or area of professional practice
- a comprehensive understanding of techniques applicable to their own research or advanced scholarship l originality in the application of knowledge, together with a practical understanding of how established techniques of research and enquiry are used to create and interpret knowledge in the discipline
- conceptual understanding that enables the student:
- to evaluate critically current research and advanced scholarship in the discipline
- to evaluate methodologies and develop critiques of them and, where appropriate, to propose new hypotheses.

Typically, holders of the qualification will be able to:

- deal with complex issues both systematically and creatively, make sound judgements in the absence of complete data, and communicate their conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audiences
- demonstrate self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems, and act autonomously in planning and implementing tasks at a professional or equivalent level

• continue to advance their knowledge and understanding, and to develop new skills to a high level.

And holders will have:

- the qualities and transferable skills necessary for employment requiring:
- the exercise of initiative and personal responsibility
- decision-making in complex and unpredictable situations
- the independent learning ability required for continuing professional development.

The Negotiated Learning Module may be taken as a dissertation or work-based project. The dissertation option is available for those who may want to take a more academic, rather than applied approach, but also for those who are posted to sensitive or high security areas, where a work-based project is inappropriate. RM and NLM may be commenced any time after ICSC(L) to allow a more continual engagement of the students.

The NLM may be taken in either Henley or SPEIR led topics.

Part-time or flexible modular arrangements

The programme is taken in two modes: The army courses are taken as per the normal teaching which is mostly residential. The Henley/SPEIR extension modules will be fully digitalized and will be taken as distance learning, very flexibly by each individual officer alongside progression in their army career.

Teaching and learning delivery

The module content for the army courses are delivered through a combination of central lectures, seminars and experiential learning. The Henley/SPEIR modules will be entirely digitalized and delivered on the CDS platform called the Personal Learning Portfolio. This will include video lectures, academic written content, multiple choice elements (for some formative assessments), additional video and audio material and assessment documentation.

Total study hours for the programme is 1800 hours. Contact hours are shown in the relevant module descriptions.

In addition to the scheduled contact hours, the student will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

The programme will be assessed through submitted coursework. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.

Progression

Part-time and modular progression requirements

In order to progress from the ICSC(L) to the further elements of the degree, a student must satisfy the Selection Board of Tthe Army and University of Reading which combines The Army entry qualifications with performance on the ICSC(L).

Classification

Army Courses (ICSCL) will be calculated on a Pass/Fail basis. All Army courses must be passed in order to qualify for the MSc Award.

Final Classification will be calculated using the marks from the UoR modules

For Master's Degree

To qualify for **Distinction**, students must

- i. Gain a Pass mark on the 100 credit ICSCL Course
- ii. gain an overall average of 70 or more over 80 credits gained in the University of Reading modules; and
- iii. a mark of 60 or more for the Negotiated Learning Module; and
- iv. the total credit value of all modules marked below 50 must not exceed 55 credits; and
- v. students must not have any mark below 40.

To qualify for **Merit**, students must

- vi. Gain a Pass mark on the 100 credit ICSCL Course
- vii. gain an overall average of 60 or more over 80 credits gained in the University of Reading modules; and
- viii. a mark of 50 or more for the Negotiated Learning Module; and

- ix. the total credit value of all modules marked below 50 must not exceed 55 credits; and
- x. students must not have any mark below 40.

To qualify for **Passed**, students must

- xi. Gain a Pass mark on the 100 credit ICSCL Course
- xii. gain an overall average of 50 or more over 80 credits gained in the University of Reading modules; and
- xiii. a mark of 50 or more for the Negotiated Learning Module; and
- xiv. the total credit value of all modules marked below 50 must not exceed 55 credits; and
- xv. students must not have any mark below 40.
