Programme information and content

The Programme aims provide you with subject-specific knowledge and more general skills, including knowledge of a variety of different kinds of literary, dramatic and performance texts, from a range of different periods. Students will become familiar with the variety of critical perspectives and analytical methods within and between the disciplines. The course aims to foster an independent approach to formulating problems and arguments, using the close reading and analytical skills that are fundamental to the disciplines of English Literature and Theatre. Students can also select optional modules which allow them to situate their study of theatre in relation to film or television forms and practices, permitting the exploration of how key concepts such as performance and genre are inflected across different mediums. The programme aims to develop students' intellectual potential, enabling them to progress to a wide range of careers or to postgraduate study, while also promoting a lifelong love of learning.

	In English Literature Part 1 introduces you to debate about approaches to the study of literature, through critical and research exercises and close study of selected texts from a number of different periods.
Part 1:	In Theatre Part 1 introduces students to the academic study of theatre and performance culture across a range of approaches and practices, instilling foundational terminology and key disciplinary debates. Students get the opportunity to engage with the discipline both theoretically/critically and practically, learning the scholarly protocol of formal essay-writing and able to choose an induction in the safe and appropriate use of theatre facilities and equipment.

In English Literature Part 2 provides you with greater breadth of coverage, and studies texts within historical periods and generic traditions. In Theatre Part 2 provides opportunities to develop students' understanding of theatre and performance culture through the discovery and investigation of particular issues explored via in-depth discussions across lectures, seminars and workshops. Students also begin their process of identifying a Dissertation or Creative Research Project topic, leading to an increasingly confident use of study resources and scholarly methodologies.
Throughout the programme, individual modules come with the option of an academic placement which complements and develops the learning on a module. Study Abroad opportunities are also available at Parts 2 and 3.
 In English Literature Part 3 gives you the opportunity to undertake more specialized and independent literary study, choosing your modules from a wide range of options. The dissertation module develops your skills in research, planning and writing. In Theatre Part 3 also fosters specialist knowledge in theatre via Options closely informed by staff research and advanced independent research and enquiry through the Dissertation or Creative Research Project on a topic of their choice, supported by staff supervision.

Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

Please note- Students with English as a second language who enter the programme with IELTS (or equivalent) below 7.0 will be required to take a programme-specific 20 credit English language module.

Part 2 Modules:

Students must select 60 credits of optional modules in English Literature. At least one of these modules must be drawn from a list of pre-1800 options.

Students must select 40 credits of optional modules in Film, Theatre and Television.

Up to 20 credits of optional modules may be substituted for modules available elsewhere in the University, subject to the approval of the Programme Director.

Modules during a placement year or study year (if applicable):

Students on one of the 4 year programmes will take one 120 credit module in either Work Experience or Study Abroad.

Students may be permitted to undertake a placement year or a study abroad year between Part 2 and Part 3 of the programme. In such cases students will transfer to a 4-year programme. The placement or study abroad year should not normally be shorter than nine months full-time.

If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

Part 3 Modules:

Students must select one 40 credit dissertation module or creative research project module.

Students must select 40 credits of optional modules in English Literature.

Students must select 40 credits of optional modules in Film, Theatre and Television.

Up to 20 credits of optional modules may be substituted for modules available elsewhere in the University, subject to the approval of the Programme Director.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your Programme is set out in the Further Programme Information. Details of optional modules for each part, including any Additional Costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs.

For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between $\pounds 150$ to $\pounds 250$ a year. Some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions.

In **Theatre** you will incur costs for theatre, cinema and/or gallery trips linked to Department modules and module assessments. These visits are an essential and very enjoyable part of your studies. We recommend that you budget between £60-to £100 for this per year. We secure discounted tickets in good seats through group booking, and travel costs can be significantly reduced by booking well in advance, travelling off-peak, and using Group Travel discounts and a 16-25 rail card. To help reduce costs, we also include visits to venues in Reading and Oxford as well as London where appropriate, and we invite practitioners to the department to perform/exhibit work and hold workshops and master classes for our students.

You are not required to purchase any practical equipment, as the Department provides the necessary equipment and facilities. If you require specialist materials for practical work, a technician will source this for you, following consultation with the relevant academic member of staff.

If you partake in Study Abroad you should expect to pay for services which you would normally expect to pay for at Reading e.g. housing, food, travel, social activities, etc. Additional costs will vary depending on the host institution and location. Please see the Erasmus and Study Abroad website for further details.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations.

Placement opportunities

Teaching and learning delivery:

In **English Literature** you will be taught through a combination of lectures, seminar discussion and essay tutorials. The Dissertation module is supported by workshops and individual supervision.

In **Film, Theatre & Television** you will be taught through lectures, seminars, supervision tutorials and, depending on your specialization and module choices, practical workshops and tutorials using our specialist equipment and facilities.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 252 hours, Part 2 - 144 hours, Part 3 - 144 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Assessment

In **English Literature** assessment is conducted through a mixture of assessed essays and formal examination.

In **Film, Theatre & Television** you will be predominantly assessed through coursework. Depending on your module choices and specialization, coursework may include essays and other forms of writing (such as blogs), practical work accompanied by documentation, videographic criticism, and presentations which may be accompanied by reflective reports.

Progression

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows

Part 1

(i) obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and(ii) obtain a mark of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 100 credits taken in Part 1.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) obtain a mark of at least 40% in the compulsory English Literature module EN1RC, and obtain a mark of at least 40% in either of the compulsory English literature modules EN1GC or EN1PE, at Part 1; and

obtain a mark of at least 40% in all compulsory modules in Film, Theatre and Television at Part 1 (FT1ATP, FT1RFT).

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Part 2

To gain a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

(i) obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken at Part 2; and
(ii) obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits; and
(iii) obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits, except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3 in the **3 year programme**, a student must achieve a threshold performance

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3 in the **4 year programme**, a student must achieve a threshold performance and obtain a pass in the professional/work placement or study abroad year. Students who fail the professional/placement year transfer to the non-placement year version of the programme.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.
