# Programme information and content

The International Foundation Programme (IFP, Part 0) aims to provide access to higher education in Britain to international students who do not possess the normal entry requirements of GCE Advanced level qualifications or the equivalent. This is achieved through the provision of high quality teaching which is sympathetic to the needs of students from a wide range of educational backgrounds. The International Foundation programme equips students with the subject specific and general study skills which will enable them to cope with the demands of undergraduate study. Students who qualify to progress from the foundation year (Part 0) will automatically be entered into Part 1 of LLB Law.

In addition to the imparting of legal knowledge, this degree programme encourages the ability to delineate and evaluate issues, select relevant materials and produce arguments encompassing policy, existing practice and knowledge, and including theorising and critiquing legal concepts and the law itself.

The overarching educational aim of this course is to provide a programme of legal study which affords a conceptual framework for the study of law which will facilitate the recognition and appreciation by students of the overall mosaic of public and private law and permits detailed study of some aspects of law. The degree aims to provide coverage of the core areas of English law while also providing a range of options which allows students to bias their studies in particular directions.

In the Foundation year you will study a compulsory 40-credit module in Law<br/>which provides a grounding in the main principles of English Law and the<br/>structure of the English Legal system. In addition, you will study a further 80<br/>credits made up of two 40 credit subject modules selected from a list of<br/>recommended modules. If your level of English is below the standard specified<br/>for undergraduate study, one of these 40 credit modules must be International<br/>English. You will have the opportunity to develop transferable skills through<br/>the provision of a compulsory credit-bearing Academic Skills module. The key

	skills relate to Critical Thinking, Essay Writing, Research, Referencing and avoiding plagiarism, Group Work and Projects, Presentations, and Assessment and Examination techniques.
Part 1:	In Part 1, you will begin with an introduction to the teaching methods and expectations applicable to higher legal education and start to develop the legal study skills you will need to study law as an academic discipline throughout your degree. You will study four key areas of English law: contract, tort, criminal and public law, and practise applying the law to fact patterns as well as developing your ability to analyse the law from a critical perspective.
Part 2:	In Part 2, you will study the remaining compulsory subjects in the qualifying law degree, and continue to develop your ability to work with primary legal resources, research the law and set out your conclusions.
Part 3:	The School offers a range of modules from which you can choose at Part 3. This choice affords you a greater opportunity to focus your study on the areas of the law that interest you most, although you must take one of the foundation modules from those offered. These may include a dissertation module, which would allow you to explore a topic in greater depth and to develop your research and writing skills more fully.

# Module information

Part 0 comprises 140 credits and Parts 1, 2 and 3 each comprise 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the International Foundation Programme

If your level of English is below the standard specified for undergraduate study, one of the 40 credit modules must be IF0IE1 International English.

All compulsory Part 0 modules consist of subjects which must be studied and passed to a specified level in order to qualify for progression to Part 1.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the School of Law or modules from elsewhere in the University.

All compulsory Part 1 modules consist of subjects which must be studied and passed to obtain a qualifying law degree.

The remaining 40 credits will be made up of modules on the list available from the School of Law or from modules available elsewhere in the University, subject to permission from the Programme Director.

#### Modules during a placement year or study year (if applicable):

Students may be permitted to undertake a placement year between Part 2 and Part 3 of the programme. In such cases students will transfer to a 4-year programme, Law with Legal Studies in Europe before entering into Part 2. The placement year should not normally be shorter than nine months full-time. If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

Students may be permitted to undertake a placement year between Part 2 and Part 3 of the programme. In such cases students will transfer to a 4-year programme in the School of Law, before entering into Part 2. The placement year should not normally be shorter than nine months full-time.

If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

# Part 3 Modules:

Student must select one foundation module from the list available from the School of Law.

Remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the School of Law with up to 20 credits from optional modules available elsewhere in the University, subject to permission from the Programme Director.

# **Optional modules:**

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your Programme is set out in the Further Programme Information. Details of optional modules for each part, including any Additional Costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

#### Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs.

For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between £150 to £200 a year. For example, in 2016/17, the bookshop on campus offered four core textbooks for Part 1, which most students normally purchase, for a combined price of £141 new. Students may take statute books into some module examinations, and in 2016/17 the bookshop on campus offered a package deal for some Part 2 and Part 3 modules of the recommended textbook and the statute book for approximately £50 per module. As statute books must be unmarked and unannotated for use in examinations, it is advisable (but not mandatory) to buy a new copy. However, some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists are listed on the individual module descriptions.

Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus at a cost per A4 page of  $\pm 0.05$  (black and white) and  $\pm 0.30$  (colour). Essential costs in this area will be low as most coursework will be submitted electronically.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations.

The estimates were calculated in 2022.

# Placement opportunities

You are encouraged to undertake placements in your vacations, which you would need to find and secure yourself with the support of the University.

# Teaching and learning delivery:

You will be taught primarily through a mixture of lectures, tutorials and seminars, depending on the modules you choose. Some modules may include group work.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 240 hours, Part 2 - 156 hours, Part 3 - 156 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

# Accreditation details

Please note that the School of Law intends that the LLB Law will be a qualifying law degree (QLD) for all students and will make any necessary changes to the degree programme to ensure it stays a QLD or continues to satisfy any modified professional requirements for the academic stage of training stipulated by the professional bodies. All other aspects of the degree programme may be subject to change where such change is educationally desirable or practically necessary.

#### Assessment

The programme will be assessed through a combination of written examinations, coursework and oral presentations depending on the modules taken in each year of study.

# Progression

# Part 0 Foundation Year

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows

(i) an overall average of at least 40% over all modules taken in Part 0;

(ii) no more than 40 credits of these modules with a mark below 35%

(iii) at least 40% in the Academic Skills module

To progress to Part 1, students must satisfy the following progression and English language requirements:

(iv) an overall average of at least 60% over all credit modules taken in part 0;

(v) at least 60% in two 40 credit modules, (LW0LAW) including any specified modules;

(vi) no module mark below 40% in the remaining two modules.

In addition, students whose first language is not English and who have not met the English language conditions set by the School of Law must obtain 55% in International English A (IF0IE1)

Students who do not meet the conditions for progression specified above, may qualify for an alternative degree at this University;

Students who do not qualify to progress to any degree at this University but who pass the International Foundation programme will be awarded an International Foundation Programme Certificate of Completion:

*To pass the International Foundation programme*, students must achieve an average of at least 40% in modules totalling 120 credits with a maximum of 40 credits of these modules having a mark below 35%, and a pass (40%) in the Academic Skills module.

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows

Part 1

(i) obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and(ii) obtain a mark of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 100 credits taken in Part 1.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) obtain an overall average of 40% across all credits taken for which a numerical mark is awarded in Part 1; and

(iv) obtain a pass of at least 40% in LW1CON, LW1PL1, LW1CRI, LW1TOR and a grade of Pass in LW1LS.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students who achieve a threshold performance only at Part 1 will be eligible for transfer to LLB Legal Studies.

Part 2

To gain a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

(i) obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken at Part 2; and
(ii) obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits; and
(iii) obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits,

except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) obtain marks of at least 40% in LW2PL2, LW2LND, LW2ETR, LW2EUL

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students who achieve a threshold performance only at Part 2 will be eligible for transfer to LLB Legal Studies.
