Programme information and content

The MSc in Leadership and Strategic Studies (Executive) aims to provide selected army officers with the higher education provision to support their service requirements and to enable them to act as effective officers of the British Army. This degree will be available to selected entrants to the Intermediate Command and Staff Course (Land), (ICSC(L)) at the Defence Academy Shrivenham, and will support their development during Career Stage 2 (CS2), following promotion to the rank of Major. All of these entrants will have studied all of the army courses in CS1.

The degree has been shaped to include the learning that they undertake on the mandatory army courses ICSC(L) during CS2 which will be strengthened by a series of modules, all at Level 7 linked to these courses and provided via a digitalized platform by Henley Business School and the School of Politics, Economics and International Relations (SPEIR).

The credit bearing of ICSC(L) can only be realized by completing the accompanying Extension Module (EM). There are Research Methods and Negotiated Learning Modules at Level 7, although commencement of these modules may begin during the middle of the programme, so that students have the opportunity to begin their understanding of Research Methods and to collect data and experiences during their work postings.

The main content of the MSc in the Extension Modules, from the Henley/SPEIR perspective is to provide academic content building on knowledge in the broad areas of Leadership and Strategic Studies. These are more heavily theoretical than the army courses and cover areas such as:

• Neuroscience and Psychology for Behavioural Change

• Contemporary British Foreign Policy

Each module is formatively and summatively assessed at the appropriate level. The Research Methods and a Negotiated Learning Project (NLM), is the Capstone element of the degree. The NLM will be available either in Leadership-based topics (Henley) or in Politics and International Relations-based topics (SPEIR), and as a dissertation form or as a work-based project.

This programme is overseen by a Board of Studies and Student Experience (BoSSE) which will be constituted specifically to focus on this suite of programmes. This BoSSE is chaired by the respective SDTL of Henley and SPEIR on a rotational basis and called the AHEP BoSSE. There is representation from Henley, SPEIR, Army (uniformed and academic), programme administration, regulatory and student support services and the relevant student body.

All regulations relating to students on UoR programmes do apply, including those for academic and non-academic misconduct.

Master's degrees are awarded to students who have demonstrated:

- a systematic understanding of knowledge, and a critical awareness of current problems and/or new insights, much of which is at, or informed by, the forefront of their academic discipline, field of study or area of professional practice
- a comprehensive understanding of techniques applicable to their own research or advanced scholarship l originality in the application of knowledge, together with a practical understanding of how established techniques of research and enquiry are used to create and interpret knowledge in the discipline
- conceptual understanding that enables the student:

- to evaluate critically current research and advanced scholarship in the discipline

- to evaluate methodologies and develop critiques of them and, where appropriate, to propose new hypotheses.

Typically, holders of the qualification will be able to:

- deal with complex issues both systematically and creatively, make sound judgements in the absence of complete data, and communicate their conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audiences
- demonstrate self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems, and act autonomously in planning and implementing tasks at a professional or equivalent level
- continue to advance their knowledge and understanding, and to develop new skills to a high level.

And holders will have:

• the qualities and transferable skills necessary for employment requiring:

- the exercise of initiative and personal responsibility

- decision-making in complex and unpredictable situations

- the independent learning ability required for continuing professional development.

The programme comprises 180 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

Students take AHME011 or AHME04.

Module AHME05 is a PASS/FAIL module. (This verification is completed by Defence Academy Shrivenham and added as exemption credits for prior learning.)

The Negotiated Learning Module may be taken as a dissertation or work-based project. The dissertation option is available for those who may want to take a more academic, rather than applied approach, but also for those who are posted to sensitive or high security areas, where a work-based project is inappropriate. RM and NLM may be commenced any time after ICSC(L) to allow a more continual engagement of the students.

The NLM may be taken in either Henley or SPEIR led topics.

Teaching and learning delivery

The module content for the army courses are delivered through a combination of central lectures, seminars and experiential learning. The Henley/SPEIR modules will be entirely digitalized and delivered on the Virtual Learning Platform (VLE) CANVAS This includes video lectures, academic written content, multiple choice elements (for some formative assessments), additional video and audio material and assessment documentation.

Total study hours for the programme is 1800 hours. Contact hours are shown in the relevant module descriptions.

In addition to the scheduled contact hours, the student will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Elements of your programme will be delivered via digital technology.

The scheduled teaching and learning activity hours and amount of technology enhanced learning activity for your programme will depend upon your module combination. In addition, for all classifications, students must

(v) obtain marks of at least 50% in all modules.

In addition to the threshold conditions for the award of a Master's degree, the following further conditions must be satisfied for a classification of Distinction or Merit:

Distinction

An overall weighted average of 70% or more over 180 credits OR An overall weighted average of 68% or more over 180 credits and marks of 70% in at least 90 credits AND A mark of at least 60% in the dissertation AND No marks below 40%

Merit

An overall weighted average of 60% or more over 180 credits

OR

An overall average of 58% or more over 180 credits and marks of 60% on at least 90 credits AND

no marks below 40.
