Programme information and content

This programme combines the LLB with a foundation year that is tailored to equip international students with the subject specific and general study skills which will enable them to cope with the demands of undergraduate study. This is achieved through the provision of high-quality teaching which is sympathetic to the needs of students from a wide range of educational backgrounds.

The aim of the LLB is to provide legal education not only in the core areas of English law required to be awarded a qualifying law degree (QLD) but also in a variety of specialisms that enrich the student's experience and understanding of how law is used to solve disputes or achieve change. The overarching educational aim of this course is to not only impart legal knowledge but: to situate the law within wider global, national policy and practice contexts; to equip students with skills necessary for research, critical analysis, and application of law in a range of issues; and to provide opportunities for students to start developing the skills crucial to legal practice.

Foundation year:	In the Foundation year you will have the opportunity to develop transferable skills through the provision of two compulsory 20-credit modules: Academic Literacy and Skills, and Academic Communication and Inquiry. If your level of English is below the standard specified for undergraduate study, these modules will ensure those English Language Entry Requirements are met. The key skills in these modules relate to Critical Thinking, Academic Writing, Research, Referencing and avoiding plagiarism, Group Work and Projects, Presentations, and Assessment and Examination techniques. You will also take a further 80 credits of subject modules as specified in the module information. These modules are aligned to the 'A Level' entry requirements for the degree and provide the knowledge and skills required for further undergraduate study at Part 1.
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	Students starting Part 0 in January will join Part 1 in September of the same year.
Part 1:	In Part 1, you will be supported in developing legal skills, and will be introduced to the teaching methods and expectations applicable to higher legal education. You will study four key areas of English law: contract, tort, criminal and Constitutional Law, and practise applying the law to hypothetical scenarios to provide targeted advice to fictitious clients, as well as developing your ability to analyse the law from a critical perspective.
Part 2:	In Part 2, you will study the remaining core modules: land, equity, EU and Administrative Law. You will also be able to choose two optional modules, one of which can be a module from another School. You will continue to develop your legal skills and ability to work with primary legal resources, to research the law and justify your conclusions.
Placement/Study abroad year:	N/A
Part 3:	In the final year, students must choose one from a range of independent research-based modules to demonstrate mastery of legal writing, legal research and the construction of a legal argument. In addition, the School offers a wide range of option modules that give you a greater opportunity to focus your study on the areas of the law that interest you most.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your programme can be found online in the Course Catalogue. Details of optional modules for each part, including any additional costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Teaching and learning delivery:

The International Foundation Year will include at least 18 hours of classroom-based teaching each week.

You will be taught primarily through a mixture of lectures, workshops, seminars and tutorials, depending on the modules you choose. Elements of your programme will be delivered via digital technology. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is around 220 hours. The scheduled teaching and learning activity hours and amount of technology enhanced learning activity for your programme will depend upon your module combination. Some modules may include group work. In addition, you will undertake some self-scheduled teaching and learning activities, designed by and/or involving staff, which give some flexibility for you to choose when to complete them. You will also be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module study hours including contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Accreditation details

Please note that the School of Law intends that the LLB will be a UK qualifying law degree (QLD), where still relevant, for all students and will make any necessary changes to the degree programme to ensure it stays a QLD or continues to satisfy any modified professional requirements for the academic stage of training stipulated by the professional bodies. All other aspects of the degree programme may be subject to change where such change is educationally desirable or practically necessary.

Assessment

The programme will be assessed through a combination of different types of assessments including more traditional methods such as written examinations and coursework (including through presentations and podcasts) as well as, for example, participation in advocacy or negotiation, writing client letters and writing reflectively about learning experiences. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.

Progression

Foundation Year

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' as follows

- (i) obtain an overall weighted average of 50% over 120 credits taken in Part 0; and
- (ii) obtain a mark of at least 40% in all individual modules.

In order to progress from Part 0 to Part 1 and be eligible for transfer to LLB Law, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) achieve a module mark at least 50% in each of Foundations of Law (IF0ELS) and Introduction to the Law of Obligations and Negligence (IF0LON).

(iv) and 50% in each of Academic Literacies and Skills (IF0ALS) and Academic Communication and Inquiry (IF0ACI).

Part 1

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 1, a student will normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain an overall weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (ii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to not less than 80 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in modules amounting to 120 credits. (A Fail in a Pass/Fail module will be treated as not meeting the minimum threshold requirement for progression or classification. Pass/fail modules are excluded from weighted average calculations but must be passed to avoid failure of the Part or degree.)

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(i) obtain an overall average of 40% across all credits taken for which a numerical mark is awarded in Part 1; and

(ii) obtain a pass of at least 40% in LW1ELS, LW1CON, LW1CRI, LW1PL1, and LW1TOR.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students considering transferring to another programme should seek guidance from their designated Support Centre in the first instance.

Part 2

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (ii) Obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits. (A Fail in a Pass/Fail module will be treated as not meeting the minimum threshold requirement for progression or classification. Pass/fail modules are excluded from weighted average calculations but must be passed to avoid failure of the Part or degree.)

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(i) obtain marks of at least 40% in LW2ETR, LW2EUL, LW2LND, and LW2PL2.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus, but essential costs in this area will be low as coursework and exams will be submitted electronically.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations. Estimates were calculated in 2026.
